Rich Walter, Vice President of Curriculum and Outreach, CIE; Associate Director of Israel Education, ISMI

A native Israeli, Michal Ilai, has been teaching Hebrew in various settings throughout her entire adult life. She began teaching in the IDF while working with illiterate soldiers, and later taught at a military prison. Suggested Packing List

Attire for most of the weekend will be casual; jeans are perfectly acceptable. The weather in Atlanta during December can range from the teens to the 60s, so be sure to check the forecast in the days leading up to the program We will be walking between buildings, so comfortable shoes and appropriate outerwear are a must.
